

My GEAR UP Student Activities Guide

From research and experience, we have compiled a list of activities that increase the likelihood that you will enroll and succeed in college. As a GEAR UP student, some of these activities are necessary in order for you to maintain your GEAR UP status and eligibility for the college scholarship; the rest of these activities are "recommended activities". Many of these activities require your parents' support or permission, so be sure to keep them informed. We do not require you to take part in these activities, but encourage you to do so, as they can help you in your preparations for college success! Congratulations and best wishes on your path to college and beyond!

Annual Activities: Please complete the following activities **each year** in order to maintain your GEAR UP status and eligibility for the college scholarship.

- With the support of school staff and my parents, I will develop and carry out a GEAR UP learning and action plan as part of my annual goals in my learning portfolio that will identify steps that I will take and what I need to learn and do in order to meet my goals to go to college.
- I will study hard in my classes and work towards at least a B average each year.
- I will participate actively in a wide variety of school activities.
- I will maintain excellent attendance.
- I will participate in part-time work, community service, volunteer activities, and service learning projects.
- I will seek out help from my teachers, parent(s) or guidance counselor if I find I'm struggling in my classes.

Recommended Activities: We suggest you complete the following activities each year.

- Be sure your GEAR UP Learning and Action Plan includes at least 3 college-ready components
- Create a Portfolio to demonstrate your learning and the goals you accomplished this year
- Participate in at least one extra-curricular activity
- Peer tutor/mentor younger students
- Volunteer in your community
- Participate in planning a community event (such as a walk-a-thon)
- Job shadow a professional
- Attend a college summer program
- Attend all college-ready activities offered by your school
- Take a virtual college tour on-line
- Complete at least 3 suggested GEAR UP activities or college-going activities approved by your school advisor.
- Talk with your parents about the things they have to do to help you get into college.
- Research potential careers
- Research potential post-secondary schools
- Participate in a mentoring program at your school
- Utilize a career planning tool such as ConnectEdu, Career Futures, Choices, My Road, etc.
- Ask your parents how they planned their careers
